








PRINCIPAL'S INTRODUCTION



Workshop 8 January 2020

This January we were visited by an engineer from Loughborough University. Goldington Academy students were given the opportunity to learn more about the critical issues facing society in the future and were challenged to develop ideas that could have an impact and improve the future by thinking like an engineer. Students developed several ideas relating to powering a city without using fossil fuels. The students then went on to build model electrical cars and challenged themselves to provide the exact amount of energy required for their car to reach the target point on the track.



Students were inspired to think like an engineer and were given careers information on how they can inspire to become an engineer in the future. Many of these students are now involved in Shell's Bright Ideas competition to design a city of the future with innovative forms of energy.

MATHS DEPARTMENT



This year, for the second time, we entered the Explore Learning National Young Mathematicians Award. The first round took place in school with Jennie from Explore Learning testing 32 of our Year Sevens' logic and reasoning skills working on a task all about the National History Museum.

In round two, the competition was judged nationally with the top 5 schools in the country being invited to the grand final. Four Year Sevens were carefully selected to represent the school: Ollie F, Ollie M, Amelie and Mary. Unfortunately, our team did not manage to finish in the top 5 of the country, however, the staff at Explore Learning were very complimentary about our hard working, logical and well organised team.

The competition is run by NRICH (a maths problem solving website) and Explore Learning. Each year, pupils in the competition try to solve a new problem solving task made especially for the event. Some of the tasks used in previous years can be found here:

This year's task was all about creating symmetrical U shapes from matchsticks. The tasks are not about the amount of maths you know, but are designed to be very tricky, hard to interpret and require a logical approach. Teams gain points for working together and as a team, managing time well and communicating, as well as for finding the correct solutions.

Year 9 Sport Studies- Walking Football Workshop

As part of their sport studies qualification, Year Nine students learn about the different sporting initiatives that are in place to increase participation in sport for all. The coach, Poppy Bennett, gave some insight into Walking Football, the sessions she has delivered and the professional players she has worked with. The students then played themselves in some skill-based games and a tournament.

After the tournament, students had a discussion on why the initiative is inclusive, important and successful. Many expressed how much harder it is in comparison to the football game they play regularly. Others also explained how enjoyable it is even if you don't play football, as everyone has to play at the same pace. The music department held a fantastic Battle of the Bands event this term, celebrating the talents of our youngsters across the year groups, as well as a music industry day exploring careers in the Arts.








DESIGN TECHNOLOGY





















ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

The importance of reading

According to the research, the time that students spend reading is one of the strongest indicators of success in all subject areas. Reading has been linked to measures of general knowledge, vocabulary, verbal fluency and the less time students spend reading, the higher the achievement gap at all ages.



According to the National Literacy Trust, the number of children who say that they read for pleasure has been declining and only 52% said they read. Furthermore, from those asked, only a quarter read every day. There are lots of distractions for our children in society today, but we would love to encourage our students to read much more to achieve their potential and also find relaxation and escapism in a busy and technological world.

In tutorial time, we set aside regular time for students to read as well as sharing with them some fantastic writing to tempt them to read more. We would like all pupils to have a book on the go and to find the time to read every day.

How can you help at home?

- Make sure that your child has a book and that they bring it to school there are plenty of fantastic books in the local libraries.
- Encourage your child to read for at least 20 minutes before bed every night.
- For younger students, they will still enjoy sharing a book, taking it in turns to read and discussing characters and themes with you. Then watch the film version if there is one and discuss the differences!
- Look on our web page for recommended reading lists to find the book that will engage your child.
- Encourage your child to join one of our book clubs (KS3 on Mondays and KS4 on Wednesdays).

World Book Day is on the 5 March and we will be celebrating this in school and sending home book tokens to go towards their next new read.

Book swap – 5 March at break. Students can start bringing in unwanted books to receive a book voucher to spend on the book swap stall at break time on WBD.

The Bookfair is coming to Goldington on the 25 March where there will be a full range of affordable secondary aged fiction available to buy. World book day tokens may be redeemed at the fair. More information will be sent home next month.

SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS

At different times through their education, lots of children can experience challenges, struggles and difficulties with their learning with things such as communication and interaction; cognition and learning; social, emotional and mental health difficulties; sensory and/or physical needs. The reasons for these difficulties are wide and complex. At Goldington Academy, we support children with their learning and their social and emotional development in a number of ways.

Each pupil identified as having additional needs has a profile, which all staff have copies of. The profile contains differentiation strategies to help the child make progress at school.

If you have any concerns or questions about your child's learning, please contact me at school by email or by phone. There is a SEND drop-in session once a week, where parents and carers can speak to the SENDCO without an appointment. The details of these sessions are published in the school newsletter, but they are normally held every Wednesday from 2.45 to 4.15 pm during term-time.
