Caroline COONEY The Ransom of Mercy Carter JF

In 1704 an Indian tribe attacks remote Deerfield, Massachusetts, and Mercy and hundreds of other settlers are ordered by the Indians to start walking. The three hundred miles to a Kahnawake Indian village in Canada takes more than 40 days. As days turn into months, Mercy slowly discovers that the "savages" have a way of life that has become her own, and she begins to wonder whether, if ransom comes, will she take it?

Tanya LANDMAN Apache JF

Siki is an orphan of the Black Mountain Apache. Her mother was killed by Mexicans three years ago and her father lost in an ambush the winter before that. When Siki witnesses the brutal murder of her little brother Tazhi, she vows to become an Apache warrior and avenge her brother's death.

John LOVEDAY Goodbye, Buffalo Sky JF

In 1870, Cappy and Alice are two teenagers living in the small frontier town of Buffalo Sky. Together they tell the story of Two Songs, a beautiful Mandan Indian who marries Buckhart, a local artist, and the effect their friendship with her has on their lives.

Diane MATCHECK The Sacrifice JF

When twins are born to an Apsalooka tribe, the boy is named Born-Great, and prophesied to become a great leader of his people, and the girl is named Weak-One-Who-Does-Not-Last. When taken into battle by the War Party, Born-Great is lost, assumed dead. Weak-One, who has lived under his shadow all her life, decides to prove her worth.

James A. MICHENER Centennial AF

A panorama of the West, this is a celebration, brimming with the glory and the greatness of the American past. The Native Americans, the migrating white men and

women, the cowboys, and the foreigners, it is a story of trappers, traders, homesteaders, gold seekers, ranchers, and hunters - all caught up in the dramatic events and violent conflicts that shaped the destiny of the legendary West.

Larry McMURTRY Lonesome Dove AF

Set in the late nineteenth century, Lonesome Dove is the story of a cattle drive from Texas to Montana - and much more. It is a drive that represents for everybody involved not only a daring, even a foolhardy, adventure, but a part of the American Dream - the attempt to carve out of the last remaining wilderness a new life.

Thomas BERGER Little Big Man AF

An amateur researcher tracks down a 111 year old survivor of the Battle of the Little Big Horn. In 1852, ten year old Jack Crabb and his elder sister are taken by the small group of Cheyenne who have killed their father. The book follows Jack's life up to the age of 34 in 1876 as he moves between Cheyenne and frontier society, feeling 'white' among the Cheyenne, and 'Cheyenne' among the white frontiersmen.

Jack SCHAEFER Shane JF/AF

A stranger rode out of the heart of the great glowing West, into the small Wyoming valley in the summer of 1889. Shane became a friend and guardian to the Starrett family at a time when homesteaders and cattle rangers battled for territory and survival. Jack Schaefer's classic novel illuminates the spirit of the West through the eyes of a young boy and a hero who changes the lives of everyone around him.

Greene, Graham: The Quiet American

An anti-war novel written at the time of the Indo-French conflict before the Vietnam War.

Gifford, Clive: Water Puppets JF

This story is set in a small village in South Vietnam in 1967, at the height of the war. Thirteen-year-old Xuan is horrified when his village is destroyed in a bomb attack. He and his family are forced to make a dangerous journey through their war-torn country in the hope of finding sanctuary with his brother in Saigon. Their arrival in the capital coincides with the Tet Offensive.

Dowell, Frances O'Roark: Shooting the Moon JF

Twelve-year-old Jamie is excited when she hears her older brother, T.J., has enlisted in the Army. Their father is a Colonel and she would love to fight for her country too. She is surprised when their father does not want T.J. to go to Vietnam.

Jamie's perspective of the young child who sees war as glamour and heroes quickly changes when she starts seeing what is going on in Vietnam. The emotions and feelings of soldiers and families help the reader to empathise with the situation at home and in the war.

Hughes, Dean: Search and Destroy JF

Recent high school graduate Rick Ward, undecided about his future and eager to escape his unhappy home life, joins the army and experiences the horrors of the war in Vietnam.

Mason, Bobbie Ann: In Country JF

In the summer of 1984, seventeen-year-old Sam Hughes is living in a small town in Kentucky. Her father was killed in Vietnam and her gentle, traumatized Uncle Emmett is suffering from the effects of Agent Orange.

Sam's growing awareness of the reality of the war, of the scars and the guilt, becomes an obsession when she falls in love with Tom at a Veteran's dance. Through her father's letters and the journal he kept 'in country', Sam begins a journey of exploration that takes her across America and helps her to come to terms with the past.

Myers, Walter Dean: Fallen Angels JF

A coming-of-age tale for young adults set in the trenches of the Vietnam War in the late 1960s. Perry, a Harlem teenager, volunteers for service when his dream of attending college fails. Sent to the front lines, Perry and his platoon come face-to-face with the Vietcong and the real horror of warfare. As Perry struggles to find virtue in himself and his comrades, he questions why black troops are given the most dangerous assignments, and why the U.S. is there at all.

O'Brien, Tim: The Things They Carried AF

This is a sequence of stories that has the unity of a novel, with recurring characters and interwoven strands of plot and theme. It aims to summarize America's involvement in Vietnam, and her coming to terms with that experience in the years that followed. Written by a soldier who served in Vietnam.

On a school trip to the plague village of Eyam in Derbyshire, Seth is moved by the story of how villagers sacrificed their lives to the Black Death. Kim and Wes are more interested in the money at the bottom of the well. When they take the coins, they also disturb the past. As the consequences of their theft unfurl, Seth is forced to wonder if Eyam's plague-ridden past has resurfaced to seek revenge.

A fictional account of the true story of the villagers of Eyam in Derbyshire, who attempted to stop the spread of the plague by cutting themselves off from the world.

GEOGRAPHY

In the first instance your books/folders and flash cards can be your main source of revision. You may also find your revision guide and exam board flash cards (if you have them) also useful. It is best to revise from condensed notes.

You also have been given:

- Four exam packs – past paper questions
- Retrieval packs for Papers 1 + 2 that are useful for recall
- Overview of case studies and examples

Revision is more than just highlighting notes. You need to read, apply and review your condensed knowledge. A suggested an example of how to spend 60 minutes revising is the following. Spend 15 minutes reading condensed content, repeat it out loud. Then spend 30 minutes applying the knowledge that you have learned – this can be completing an exam question from your exam packs. Then spend the final 15 minutes checking that what you have written is correct – go back to your condensed notes to review your answer.
