We hope that you will find the information in this newsletter useful. Please do not hesitate to contact us if you require any further information or support with any of the topics raised.



Visitors to Goldington Academy

Many visitors come to Goldington Academy and may include parents, professionals, interviewees etc. Visitors must always enter the school site through the main reception and must sign in through our Inventory system. First time visitors must read our Code of Conduct. All visitors must wear a visitor's badge at all times. Any visitor on site who is not wearing a badge will be asked to sign in and wear a visitor's badge by a member of staff.

Some visitors to school will present an enhanced DBS check or reassurances from their employer that they have been properly vetted to work alone on a school site. In this case, visitors will be given a green lanyard to wear. Where checks have not been presented to the reception staff, visitors will be given a red lanyard to wear and must be supervised by a member of Goldington Academy staff whilst on the school site.





Visitors with a GREEN lanyard can work alone at Goldington Academy without supervision.



Visitors with a RED lanyard MUST be accompanied by a member of Goldington Academy staff whilst in the school.
