PARIS TRIP

From 8-11 October, the French department had the absolute pleasure of taking 30 of our Year Eleven linguists for a 4-day trip to Paris. After a smooth journey from Bedford to London St Pancras (no train strikes this year!) to the Gare du Nord, Paris, on the Eurostar, we had just enough time to unpack and eat, before heading out to explore Paris as the sun was setting. The highlight, of course, was our visit to see the Eiffel Tower "par nuit", all lit up and sparkling, an iconic "Instagramable" way to start our trip.

On day two, we met up with 27 French students and their teachers from our partner school, Lycée Pierre de Courbetin in Meaux, for a Franco-British team-building activity centring on the famous residents of the Cimetière de Montparnasse. We saw the graves of past French Presidents, war heroes, actors, singers and philosophers/writers, such as Jean Paul Sartre and Simone de Beauvoir. In the afternoon, pupils had the opportunity to "faire du shopping" in the Les Halles mall and vintage shops near the Centre Pompidou, before we headed, by metro, to the observation deck at Tour Montparnasse, for awesome panoramic views of the city's famous landmarks and monuments, and the iconic Parisian rooftops. Quelle belle ville!

The third day started with a walking tour of the beautiful Sorbonne, Latin Quarter, lle de la Cité and Notre Dame areas, with some excellent guides. After lunch, we then embarked on a river cruise enjoying the beauty of the Seine, with its 17 bridges and its legendary views of all of Paris' landmarks. A quick dash, before dinner, to the Louvre for our last visit of the day, where we saw the Venus de Milo, Delacroix's "Liberty leading the People" (commemorating the French Revolution) and, of course, the most famous painting in the world, the Mona Lisa (aka La Joconde). Une journée magnifique!



Southwold


Our wonderful Year Eleven geographers went to Southwold on Thursday, 2 and Friday, 3 October to investigate the effectiveness of the sea defences on Southwold's beach. They explicitly studied how effective the groynes were at slowing down longshore drift. They worked hard, thinking and acting like geographers, and they proudly represented the school. They even enjoyed some fish and chips and ice cream by the sea! It was an enjoyable trip all round. Well done Year Eleven. Here are a few words about the trip from our wonderful Year Eleven geographers:

"Southwold was an amazing trip, where we investigated whether groynes were successful in managing longshore drift. We believe that it served as an impactful trip which allowed us to apply the geography of which we learnt in class into real life. Despite the chilly weather and the rain on Friday, we all really enjoyed the trip too, and it allowed us to see geography beyond the classroom and in realworld scenarios. We were also delighted to be treated at the end with ice cream. A great finish to our trip! By using a property quality survey, orange drift test, sand height measurements and beach size calculations, we were encouraged to make and test our own hypotheses, which really helped our understanding of applying geographical knowledge. Overall, we believe that it was a great way to not only have fun on the beach but also broaden our educational understanding in preparation for our geography paper 3, section B on fieldwork enquiries".



Oxbridge



A group of Year Eleven students attended a special event at Bedford School, designed to help them understand how to prepare for applications to the UK's top universities. The session was led by a Cambridge University admissions tutor, who offered valuable insight into what universities look for in strong candidates. Students learned that academic curiosity, wide reading beyond the curriculum and genuine enthusiasm for their chosen subject are key qualities that admissions teams hope to see. The tutor also highlighted the importance of developing criticalthinking skills through activities such as academic competitions, independent projects and super-curricular enrichment.

The event provided a helpful overview of the Oxbridge selection process, explaining that interviews often involve discussing unfamiliar ideas, working through challenging problems aloud, and demonstrating *how* applicants think, rather than testing what they already know. Although university applications may seem a long way off, the evening encouraged students to begin building the skills, confidence and experiences that will help them shine when the time comes to apply.



KS3 Cross-curricular Trip

The annual cross-curricular trip for Year Nine to Foster Hill Road Cemetery with history, science, art and French took place on Thursday, 6 November. It was great to see the students investigating the richness of information about people, places and processes through a variety of subjects. For example, using science and geography, they investigated the type of lichen and its coverage on

gravestones to look for patterns and correlations with other factors such as weathering. Students also listened to an excellent presentation by Annie Berman about the history of key figures buried in the cemetery with links to Bedford and further afield. Once back in the classroom, they transferred this experiential knowledge into procedural knowledge.

Geography Club As always, the Geography Club have had a busy and productive

start to the term. They remain committed to focusing on creative projects that aim to raise the profile about important global issues such as climate change. They are currently working on creating some festive decorations crafted from recycled materials. Their creations reflect their wider commitment to the environment. They are planning to display their creations alongside the giant snowman from last year in the main hall to educate the school about ethically-sourced presents and the need to support a circular economy through recycling. We also investigated this ourselves using environmental quality surveys and traffic counts.

Antarctica Day


Following

Author Visit


This term in the library, pupils have been exploring the wonderful world of poetry.




Black History Month 2025

Design & Technology

Celebrating creativity, sustainability and innovation

This term, our Year Seven pupils have been busy exploring Design and Technology, combining creativity with responsibility. Their main project focused on designing and manufacturing personalised keyrings using HDPE plastics, a material chosen for its durability and recyclability. Pupils learned how designers, manufacturers and consumers can make choices that protect our planet. From selecting recyclable materials to reducing waste, they explored what it means to be a responsible global citizen in the design process. In addition, pupils discovered how designers use biomimicry, taking ideas from natural forms and processes to solve human challenges. I was particularly pleased at the pupils' development in regards to their practical skills, most notably in shaping, finishing and assembling their HDPE keyrings, while considering



aesthetics, functionality and environmental impact. Why This Matters: Design and Technology is not just about making products, it is about thinking critically, solving problems and shaping a sustainable future.

Our Year Seven pupils have also been inspired by the vibrant work of Yinka Ilori, exploring his unique approach of using happiness and storytelling through parables to create bright, colourful patterns on 2D design. This creative journey marks the beginning of their exciting "Light me up!" project, which they will be developing throughout the term. We cannot wait to see the amazing outcomes!

Alongside their design work, pupils have been learning about thermoforming and thermosetting plastics, gaining hands-on experience with vacuum forming techniques. These skills

will play a key role in bringing their moodlight designs to life. Stay tuned for updates as their ideas transform into stunning, functional pieces! See how well their patterns transfer onto the HIPS using the heat press!

Design & Technology

Architecture with purpose

This term, our Year Eight pupils have been exploring the inspiring work of world-renowned architect Zaha Hadid, whose bold and futuristic designs have transformed skylines across the globe. Pupils were challenged to design a building that could serve as a safe and functional space for displaced communities around the world.

The project included several creative stages such as free-hand sketching, CAD development, collaborate model building and a final presentation. Working in teams, pupils constructed cardboard models of their final designs. This hands-on stage encouraged problem-solving, communication, and teamwork.

The creativity and empathy shown throughout this project have been fantastic. Pupils not only developed technical skills but also considered the social impact of design, an essential lesson for future innovators.





Design & Technology

Year Nine Design & Technology – creative pewter projects

This term, our Year Nine pupils have been exploring the world of art and design movements, taking inspiration from iconic styles such as Art Deco and Art Nouveau. Their challenge? To design and manufacture a unique pewter product for a chosen client.

Using Computer-Aided Design (CAD) and Computer-Aided Manufacturing (CAM), pupils transformed their ideas into reality. From initial sketches to digital modelling and finally casting their pewter pieces, students demonstrated creativity, precision and technical skill throughout the process.



This term, Year Ten pupils have completed a focused design unit exploring the principles behind Alessi's iconic products. The project combined research, design development and practical skills. Pupils studied the work of leading Alessi designers, examining the inspiration behind their designs and how aesthetics and functionality are combined in everyday

objects. For example, Starck's form over function "Juicy Salif", how could they reflect this notion within their own work. Using these insights, pupils created concepts for a pizza cutter handle in the Alessi style. They applied design strategies including sketching, ergonomic considerations, and iterative development. To develop their prototype modelling skills, pupils learned how to use the hot wire cutter to shape styrofoam accurately, gaining experience in material handling and model-making techniques.

Year Ten created a great range of final models. The final models demonstrate strong design thinking and attention to detail. Each piece reflects the designer's interpretation of Alessi's approach while maintaining practical usability.

School Uniform Expectations

We would like to take this opportunity to remind you of our uniform policy - please see below:

Pupil non-compliance

Teachers can discipline pupils for breaching the school's rules on appearance or uniform. This should be carried out in accordance with the school's published behaviour policy. The Principal, or a person authorised by the Principal, may ask a pupil to go home briefly to remedy a breach of the school's rules on appearance or uniform. When making this decision, schools need to consider the child's age and vulnerability, the ease and time it will take, and the availability of the child's parents.

This is not an exclusion but an authorised absence. However, if the pupil continues to breach uniform rules in such a way as to be sent home to avoid school, or takes longer than is strictly necessary to effect the change, the pupil's absence may be counted as an unauthorised absence. In either case, the pupil's parents must be notified and the absence should be recorded. If a school is considering excluding a pupil in response to breaches of uniform policy, then this must be in line with the legal requirements for exclusion.

Form Tutors and Heads of Year will routinely check the uniform and equipment of students in their year group/ form group and will follow the procedure outlined below when challenging non-compliance with the academy uniform and equipment policy.

Unacceptable items of uniform/dress:

Trousers with decorative items, such as buttons or embroidery are **NOT** permitted. Trousers should be tailored and **NOT** be made of stretch, lycra, skinny or highly fashionable in style, nor should they have cargo or jeans style pockets. Dark grey shorts do not form part of the school uniform and therefore they should not be worn.

- Jewellery other than that listed below is NOT allowed:
- ♦ One small plain stud in each ear
- ♦ One ring permitted on each hand
- Bracelets on the grounds of religious or medical needs
- Please note piercing retainers are not allowed to be used as a substitute for piercings. Any student attending school with piercings that are not permitted will be asked to remove them, once they have healed. No other visible body piercing is acceptable. A watch may be worn provided it is marked with the owner's name.
- The wearing of wrist bands and bracelets is not permitted, unless for religious purposes.
- Only badges provided by the school are to be worn.
- Hair styles should NOT include unnatural colours, patterns or designs. Any student wearing unnatural colour in their hair will be asked to remove it immediately.
- No tramlines or patterns should be shaved into hair or the eyebrows.
- Hair bands should be discreet and plain in colour e.g. black, blue etc. Fashion type hair bands should not be worn in school.
- Trainers should not be worn during classroom-based lessons, unless otherwise agreed by the Academy Principal. If trainers are to be worn for an agreed reason, they should be black and discreet.
- Light make-up may be worn e.g. concealer, mascara. However, students may be asked to remove make-up if it is deemed to be inappropriate or too heavy e.g. foundation.
- Nail varnish should **NOT** be worn. Any students who are found to be wearing nail varnish will be asked to remove it. Continued wearing of jewellery, nail varnish will result in a referral to the Head of Year and may result in a consequence such as loss of break/lunch time.



Year Sevens Crime Scene Investigates

There has been a murder!

The specialist CSI and STEM workshop paid us their annual visit to CSI Challenge the Year Sevens to think, analyse & solve like a forensic scientist. The exhibition space was transformed into a crime scene and our students into detectives! A body has been found with blood on its hands. They had to combine critical thinking, teamwork and problem solving to work together to solve a crime. The student investigators visit the crime scene and establish who committed the crime. Using forensic techniques, fingerprinting, codebreaking, chemical analysis, logical reasoning and collaboration to piece together the mystery. Any mistakes can contaminate the evidence - the wrong suspect may be found guilty. Someone could get away with murder!



STEM club kicked off this academic new year with some shocking news.

New comers to Thursday's STEM club have had lots of fun in lab 7 starting off with Static Magic! The STEMgineers as if by magic, moved coke cans without using their hands, bending water from the tap and even lit a Bunsen burner without a match, just their hand, whilst connected to the Van de Graph generator. Special Education Needs & Disabliity Update



SEND identification:

According to the Code of Practice. "a pupil has SEND where their learning difficulty or disability calls for special educational

provision, namely provision different from or additional to that normally available to pupils of the same age."

Teachers are responsible for every pupil including those with SEND.

Teachers are responsible for the progress and development of every pupil in their class, including those who get extra support from teaching assistants or

The first step in supporting all pupils, including those with SEND, is high-quality teaching, scaffolded for individual

Some pupils may need additional help to access the curriculum to make expected progress. These pupils may have SEND.

Not every pupil making slower progress has SEND.

Some pupils may make slower progress for a reason unrelated to SEND, such as a gap in their learning.

Teachers regularly assess the progress of all pupils and work with the SENDCo to identify whether a pupil has SEND. Some factors to consider are the following:

- Significantly slower than that of their peers starting from the same baseline
- Failing to match or better the pupil's previous rate of progress
- Failing to close the attainment gap between the pupil and their classmates
- Widening the attainment gap

Pupil Passports:

Strategies and bespoke approaches for SEND students are shared with teaching staff via Pupil Passports. This document is co-produced with students, parents and the SEND team. Passports are sent home with the interim reports, and you have a chance to feedback if you want to review any strategies. Please contact Miss Johnstone (johnstonec@goldington.beds.sch.uk) if this is the case.

SEND consultation meetings:

A series of productive SEND meetings with parents and students took place over the course of the summer term to discuss progress, provision and Pupil Passports. If you would like to meet with the SENDCo, then please feel free to contact us to book a Monday slot from January onwards. Correspondence about the next round of SEND consultation meetings will be sent out via Parentmail. Please make your appointment times via the booking system.





In October, 31 students had the exciting opportunity to visit the Houses of Parliament in London.






Parallel

A number of keen mathematicians have cultivated their love of problem solving by joining Parallel, a wonderful free online resource which gives a weekly challenge going beyond the school curriculum. These puzzles, called Parallelograms, are designed to help build curiosity, creativity, logic and tenacity.

A recent Parallelogram required students to imagine a standard die rolling across a small grid, rotating 90° each move, then working out which face ends up on top after a sequence of rolls.

Another popular puzzle was a version of the classic "four-card problem." This involves a series of cards, plus a rule, such as: "If a card has a circle on one side, then it must have blue on the other side." Students were then shown several cards (with shapes or colours on front), and asked: which cards must you turn over to check whether the rule is being followed?

Students should speak to Mr Marston if they wish to join the Parallel group.





Goldington Distinction Award

This half-term, some ambitious Year Eight students have completed a series of tasks as part of the Goldington Distinction Award, in which students work towards a Bronze, Silver or Gold badge by displaying the personal qualities which reflect Goldington Academy's core values: Engaging Minds, Nurturing Success and Inspiring Futures. Doing so has given them opportunities to show creativity, develop research skills and make contributions to the wider school community.

For the Teacher Interview, Olivia T asked Miss Reynolds about her most memorable moment as a dance teacher, and received this beautiful reply: "I was practising with my Year nines and we had been building up the dance routines and perfecting it for over 3 years. The Scholars Programe

After a highly competitive selection process, fourteen Year 9 students have begun the Scholars Programme, designed to help them build the knowledge, skills and confidence needed to progress to the most selective universities.

Over recent weeks, they have taken part in a series of university-style seminars about the formation of our solar system, led by PhD researcher Faye Davies, a leading expert in her field.

Students initially explored a relatively simplistic model of planetary formation, but soon progressed onto complex theories of gravitational collapse within giant molecular clouds. They have also looked at various past and current space missions exploring planets and moons in our solar system.

The programme will conclude with students producing a dissertation, complete with formal referencing, before "graduating" on a visit to a prestigious university. For now, the students are thoroughly enjoying the chance to learn about a fascinating topic at a very advanced level of detail.


