In many ways the school has run normally since September. Our attendance figures show that the vast majority of children are attending and taking a full and active part in the activities of the academy. It has been wonderful to meet the new Year 7s and see the Year 8s



move around the school in a normal fashion. A feature for Year 9 is that they are enjoying their Personalised Learning choices and Year 10 have begun their GCSE options. Best wishes to all Year 11s who are engaged in a mock exam process that takes place both before and after the Christmas holidays. Go for it!

A huge amount of enhancements to the site went on over the summer period. I am delighted with the new PE changing rooms, two new classrooms, retarmacked playground and new carpark. The latter will hopefully alleviate some of the parking issues that our neighbours have had in more recent times.

Thank you very much to all of you who submitted questionnaire responses earlier in the term. 79 staff, 383 parents and 766 pupils responded to our survey and a full and abbreviated set of results can be found under the "Performance" tab of our website.

Another piece of external review we have taken part in since September was a two day visit from the NSPCC that looked at all our safeguarding procedures. The full report can be found under the "Safeguarding" tab on our website. Overall we were delighted with this work and the report found that there "was a strong culture of safeguarding at Goldington Academy". More coverage is given on page 28 of this newsletter.

Sadly we say goodbye to Mrs Shortland (Cover Supervisor) and Mr Campbell (English Teacher). Both have made super contributions to the school, in their different ways, in recent times. I would like to thank them both, but I would like to finish by acknowledging the contribution Mrs Hopkinson (Learning Support Assistant) has made to school since she joined us in 2004. Over the past 17 years, Mandy has quietly set about working with thousands of young people at Goldington. In addition to her teaching assistant responsibilities she often contributed within performing arts as well. I would like to take this opportunity to thank her for her tremendous contribution. We all very much hope she enjoys her retirement!

BRONZE ARTS AWARD


This term we launched the Bronze Arts Award. This is a qualification run by the Arts Council to develop students' passion for the arts. We are running it with support from the University of Bedfordshire, which has allowed us to bring in a professional dance artist and choreographer, Hannah Pickett, to lead the group. Hannah is working with the group to develop their skills in dance. The group have created some beautiful pieces of choreography this term and the dance department are working on opportunities for them to share their work.

The Creative Arts Team would like to introduce you to our Arts and Culture Challenge.

The challenge has been designed to inspire and widen our students' horizons and deepen their cultural and arts experiences within and around Bedford. With the lack of opportunity in the arts over the last year, we wanted to signpost our students to the arts and culture on their doorstep. To do this, we have created the '60 by 16' challenge. This is a list of 60 things to do, discover and experience before you turn 16.

Year 7, 8 and 9 students have been given a booklet with our first 60 challenges for them to explore with their family and friends. All they need to do is tick it off and select a new challenge to continue to explore Bedford's hidden treasures.



We are also encouraging our students to email us with their experiences of the challenges and to suggest some new ones. We see the first 60 challenges as a starting point and are looking forward to adding our students' ideas to the list.

FEEDER SCHOOLS

The Creative Arts Team have had a busy term visiting our feeder schools over the last term. We loved dancing with St John Rigby, exploring and deepening their knowledge of South America though a tribal and carnival inspired workshop. We enjoyed our ceramics making at the Hills with lots of very creative children.

Mr Stratton delivered a drama workshop on Greek Theatre to the Year 6 pupils at Hazeldene, which the children loved, and Mr King made plenty of noise making music out of basketballs at Brickhill. They have already asked him back!

DANCE

Year 9 dance students were the first group to experience live theatre since our return to school this year. During the autumn term, we were invited along to the University of Bedfordshire to watch the premiere of new by immerging dance work Hip Hop choreographers. The group were immersed in the beats and breaks of the style and were able to see the energy needed to perform this street dance style. This has really enriched their understanding in their recent dance topic. They were particularly pleased to meet Simon Quang, one of the dance artists, at the end of the show.



Goldington dance department is super pleased to announce that we have started our U:Dance journey. The application process has finally opened and we are beginning rehearsals in earnest. The students, and Mrs Mahoney, are particularly looking forward to this event as we missed the performance by one week due to the first lockdown. U:Dance offers our students a chance to dance at the highest level within the South East, with only the very best in the region selected. This platform then acts as a springboard to represent the region at a national level. But, before we get ahead of ourselves, Mrs Mahoney needs to choreograph it!



DRAMA



Once again, Goldington Academy was invited to contribute to 'ACT!', a collaborative theatre festival organised and hosted by Bedford Modern School. Having been a part of the line-up since 2015, this event is a calendar highlight for our school community and we are pleased to report that once again, Goldington Academy pupils rose to the occasion! We were joined this year by pupils from Biddenham International School and Sports College, Lincroft Academy and, of course, Bedford Modern School. Pupils from all schools had to respond creatively to a stimulus and devise an original piece of theatre. All pieces were then 'put together' to form one performance that was shared with parents and friends on the evening of 15 November. Goldington Academy pupils created an episodic piece of abstract theatre that explored the moral messages in reimagined Disney classics. Their piece was original, creative, thoughtprovoking and funny! Well done to our ACT!'21 cast.





Year 7 drama club have been working hard with Miss Gardner on the creation and development of a Christmas themed performance! It has been fantastic to see lots of Year 7s attending drama club regularly and working together creatively. This term, the performances will be small scale and take place during the school day. DRAMA



Our Year 11 GCSE drama pupils have been busy working on their Component 1 non-examined assessment. For this task, pupils are required to produce an original piece of

theatre in response to a stimulus and create a portfolio of supporting evidence before evaluating their final performance. Component 1 is worth a total of 40% of their GCSE and really challenges the pupils to put into practice everything they have learnt over the course. As this is a live assessment we cannot possibly comment on the outcome, but we can say a huge well done to the pupils for their grit and determination in completing what, at times, can be a very challenging task!

Rehearsals are underway for our upcoming production, 'Back to the 80's'. The Creative Arts Team would like to once again thank all the pupils who auditioned – over 90! – and congratulate the final cast on their roles. This is a really fun show and we cannot wait to share it with you.


lovely recycled HDPE (milk bottles and bottle tops) keyrings and packaging to promote awareness of these issues!






ENGLISH & LITERACY ACROSS THE CURRICULUM

During the difficult experiences of 2020, 3 in 5 children in a survey carried out by the National Literacy Trust, said that reading made them feel better and we believe that reading is a companion for life. Our ambition is to encourage a love of reading for pleasure, because the research shows that not only does this make more successful adults through increasing cultural capital and vocabulary, but it is also beneficial for mental health, allowing us to escape into another world, and gives us lifelong enjoyment.

We have been reading in form time to build a shared enjoyment of books and to develop reading stamina. Hopefully students will begin their own independent reading journey or be introduced to books they might not normally read. The books we have chosen are selected because they are engaging, diverse and allow students to build on their understanding of cultural contexts. This term we have been reading The Diary of Anne Frank and Point Blanc (by Alex Rider) in Year 7; Salt to the Sea (Ruta Sepetys) and I am Malala (Malala Yousafzai) in Year 8 and Noughts and Crosses (Malorie Blackman) and The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-time (Mark Haddon) in Year 9. Our library is also back up and running and has a very large range of exciting and magical fiction to inspire and engage. The library is open before school, at break and



lunchtimes as well as after school. In English, your child's class will also be taken regularly to the library during their lessons and this will recommence in the New Year.

With Christmas coming up, encourage reading at home by making a good book one of the presents you buy your child. 




GEOGRAPHY DEPARTMENT



HISTORY DEPARTMENT

looking to extend their general SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS

Special Educational Needs & Disability (SEND) provision at Goldington Academy focuses on an inclusive, collaborative and holistic approach whereby the ethos of "all teachers are teachers of SEND" operates. To this extent, we focus on a Quality First Teaching (QFT) whereby scaffolding or differentiation (as appropriate) form the foundation of all lessons; this approach is in line with the SEND Code of Practice document (2015).

Each pupil identified as having additional needs has a Pupil Passport, which all staff have copies of. The passport contains support strategies to help the pupil make progress at school.

To embed an inclusive approach to teaching and learning, expectations of all lessons are that:

- Background of all power points to be pastel shade in colour. 1.
- Print outs of power points for SEN students (as appropriate) allows for ease of access for 2. students
- 3. Adaptation of power points/presentations to avoid text heavy content.

Where interventions do take place with identified students (based on lack of progress), these will be during form times so that crucial teaching time with subject specialists is not compromised. Current SEND interventions include Lexia, guided reading, Year 8 maths, spelling and mentor sessions with Year 11s.

To support the social and emotional well-being of our students, a "Fun Friends club" operates at lunchtimes on Mondays – Thursdays for those who may want a bit of quiet space or joining in arts, crafts and games. On Fridays, a Year 10 & 11 Mental Health drop-in session is available for those who might want to talk through any social, emotional or mental health difficulties being experienced. GCSE Independent Study is also available at lunchtimes for academic support.

If you have any concerns or questions about your child's learning, please contact me at school by email or by phone. There is a SEND drop-in session once a week, where parents and carers can speak to the SENDCO without an appointment. These are normally held every Friday from 2.45 to 4.00 pm during term-time. At present, due to Covid protocols, these are on a phone call basis.

LIFESKILLS

In Life Skills this term, Years 7 – 10 have been considering 'Life Beyond School'.

Year 7 have explored careers, teamwork and enterprise skills and will be delivering short presentations in the final week of term about job descriptions for careers involved in Christmas festivities. We are looking forward to seeing their wonderful teamwork and presenting skills.

Year 8 have been considering equal opportunities in the workplace, careers and life choices and different types and patterns of work. This has provided the opportunity for plenty of interesting discussions and using Unifrog has supported students to explore careers in their own time as well.

With this year being the year of their GCSE options, Year 9 have been considering different career pathways, their strengths and aspirations, and have explored the routes that are open to them post-16 and beyond. They have also been delving into Unifrog to complete quizzes and explore the careers library to help them develop their shortlist of subjects to choose.

Year 10 have been exploring financial decision making, including financial planning, avoiding debt, gambling and the impact of advertising on financial choices (quite a timely topic in the run-up to Christmas!). Students have taken part in a virtual workshop, run by volunteers The Personal Finance Society via the 'My Personal Finance Skills' scheme. The Personal Finance Society is the leading UK professional body for financial planners, and although the workshop was virtual due to the pandemic, students engaged well and heard from financial experts about 'Dream versus Reality', giving them plenty to think about when planning their future and career.

GARDENING — SPACE TO GROW



Space to Grow is an innovative project started this year to allow small groups of students from Years 7-9 to learn skills and areas of the national curriculum outside of the classroom environment, allowing them to benefit from a different style of teaching in addition to their science lessons. Students have taken part in multiple projects so far, such as re-growing food from scraps, building a business plan for plant-based venture, making propagators, growing various microgreens and making various decorations for our Christmas tree! Students have said that the project has

'made them enjoy science', that *'the ideas are great'* and they have *'learnt a lot'*. The project is making a real positive impact, not just for the students involved but we are creating an area which can be enjoyed by all. We have lots more ideas for the future and have harvested lots of seeds so hopefully we will have a successful fruit, flower, tree and vegetable crop next year - watch this space!

Our lunchtime gardening club, Grow @ Goldington, continues to run with Mrs Sacre, and Mrs Harvey runs an additional lunchtime gardening club when she is in school for the Space to Grow project.

We are always on the look-out for items to upcycle and use as planters, or for items of gardening equipment such as trowels, brooms and dustpan and brushes. If you have anything to donate, please do let us know!



CAREERS



This term Year 11 have heard from many of our post-16 providers about their courses and study options, leading up to their applications for their next chapter post-Goldington. Assemblies have been delivered in-person or virtually and include Kimberley College, Bedford Academy, St Thomas More, Moulton College and Bedford College.

Year 11 form tutors and Mr Hall are currently busy writing references for the students in their forms, and it has been wonderful to see so many applications being made across the year group. Our careers advisor, Faye Gadsby, has continued to be in school on Thursdays to meet with students and provide

careers guidance, making use of Unifrog and post-16 provider websites to explore options for next year and beyond. Although we are currently focusing on Year 11 students while they undertake this stage of their school career, Faye is available to speak with students of any year group during lunchtime drop-ins. Appointments are bookable via Mrs Sacre.

Over twenty volunteer members of teaching and support staff have further supported our Year 11 students with short mock interviews this half term, to help them prepare for their post-16 interviews. Staff were allocated a small group of students each, and they then organised the mock interviews using questions and criteria gathered from some of our post-16 providers. Students have found the experience 'really useful' and 'helpful to make me think about what I will say in the real interview' and several have commented that it has helped them to feel less anxious about their upcoming interviews. We wish everyone the best of luck!

There have also been plenty of careers-related activities taking place around school in different subject areas, including embedded within lessons and trips/visits. Year 10 DT students visited the Frogmore Papermill to look around at the workplace machinery and how it works, speaking with employees at the mill about their job roles. In a cross-curricular trip between geography, history, science and art, Year 9 students visited Foster Hill Cemetery where they investigated types of lichens and the impact of weathering (scientific and geographical careers) and located historical figures that were buried there. There was a live streaming of coverage from COP26 in Glasgow for Year 7, where they explored aspects of climate change and careers linked with journalism, engineering, politics and the environment. Year 10 geographers have been exploring the impacts of regeneration on Bedford Town Centre and have discussed town planning, geographers and being a civil servant. Year 10 hospitality and catering students took part in a webinar with IGD where they had interactions with professionals in the industry to develop employability skills. These are just a few of the activities that our students have had the opportunity to take part in; there are many more events planned for the coming months across all year groups and subject areas.

Year 10 have been involved in The Skills Builder Partnership this term, which aims to boost students' eight employability skills – Listening, Speaking, Aiming High, Staying Positive, Creativity, Problem Solving, Teamwork and Leadership. These skills are important for future careers, and students have been evaluating their own skills via the Benchmark platform, developing skills within Life Skills lesson via bespoke activities, and identifying where they are using them in other aspects of school and home life. 
