MATHEMATICS

JUNIOR MATHS CHALLENGE

On Thursday 29 April, 122 of our Year Seven and Eight pupils completed the Junior Maths Challenge run by the UK Mathematics Trust. This is a national competition for pupils entered by many schools with the top 40% of entries across the country gaining certificates.

We had an enormous 68 pupils who gained bronze, silver or gold awards - a super effort! While this is a fantastic achievement for all 68 of these pupils, a special mention must go to:

Four of these pupils scored highly enough to qualify for a follow on round and I am delighted to say that Frank M went on to achieve a Merit in this as well!

The questions are challenging and designed to make even the best mathematicians think. In some of them the maths involved is not difficult, but a logical approach is required.

Here is an example question from the paper:

Each of the numbers 1 to 9 is to be placed in a different cell of the grid shown so that the sum of the three numbers in each row is 15. Also, the sum of the two numbers in each shaded column is to be 15.

How many choices are there for the number to be placed in the central cell indicated by *?

A 0 B 1 C 2 D 3 E 4

We are very lucky to have so many talented mathematicians. Well done to all of you who took part.

YEAR TEN MATHS

On Monday 4 July a group of Year Ten pupils went to the University of Bedfordshire to participate in an event run by the Advanced Mathematics Support Programme. Students spent the day taking part in mathematical talks and engaging with some different activities outside of the usual curriculum areas. Post GCSE options and career paths in mathematics were discussed and students gained a better understanding of their options moving forward in maths. Students particularly enjoyed the fourth dimension workshop and were able to create their own 4D representations, tesseracts. It was a great day, enjoyed by all!

DESIGN TECHNOLOGY

YEAR SEVEN



As new designers of the future, our environment and the world around us are so vital to understand . Pupils have looked at how technology and products have developed to make them more efficient and

effective. That is why we study, and learn, how designers use the concept of biomimicry and biomorphic design within their products. Designers and manufacturers have been using these concepts for years! Lots of discussions and various tasks allow the pupils to identify real life products where this is happening! Using the ideas of nature as inspiration for form we then design and make our wonderful LED key rings, designed on 2D design and made on the laser cutter! After lots of assembling, there were some fantastic outcomes!



Year Seven students enjoyed the challenge of designing and making a **vacuum formed travel game**. Inspired by their country of choice, students investigated their theme through client information and mood boards.



STEM

Design Technology is part of the STEM subjects and, as such, we try to reflect this within our curriculum as much as possible. Obvious activities are coding and programming and how it can be used in everyday products and systems. 

MOUNTFITCHET CASTLE

In May, 65 Year Seven historians spent the day at Mountfitchet Castle in Stansted. The open-air museum is a recreated Norman castle and village, designed to give visitors a real feel of what it might have been like to live and work in this fascinating era. Students enjoyed wandering around the site and looking at the various buildings and tableaux of village life - the free-roaming rescue animals proved very popular! An added bonus to the day came in the form of a quick visit to the House on the Hill Toy Museum, which shares the site. The Museum contains the largest toy collection in the world with over 80,000 toys from the Victorian era right up to the 1990s. This comment from a Year 7 student who participated in the trip sums up the day:

'Recently Year Seven went on an amazing history trip all about the Normans. What was the most exciting bit? There was so much! Whether it was seeing realistic Norman houses and other buildings or the farm life, I can't say. Or was it the Toy Museum? Altogether it was a really fun trip and we all loved it.' Ella

NATIONAL ARCHIVES



Year Nine history classes experienced a virtual session with the National Archives in April. The hourlong online session was led by an historian, who worked with classes on the focus of *'On the Front'*. The session consisted of guided source work, using

evidence stored in the National Archives, and aimed to shine a light on the experiences of British soldiers fighting abroad in World War One. Students were posed the question, 'How typical were Albert Edward Rippington's experiences during the war?' This linked well with our unit of study entitled, 'Why do we remember the First World War?'

We are looking forward to engaging with the National Archives again next year, with our intention of enabling all classes in Key Stage Three to undertake an online session.

Speakers for Schools are running a series of summer holiday work experience opportunities with large national employers.



YEAR SEVEN CSI WORKSHOP

The brief:

A body has been found with blood on its hands - but is it the sign of a murder? Students need to use their detective minds to determine the evidence that is most important and what it actually proves.

Teams had to analyse the scene, conduct forensic tests, interpret evidence and scrutinise statements made by witnesses and suspects. Players used techniques spanning the ages of detection, from powder fingerprinting through to the latest DNA fingerprinting tests. They applied their best problem-solving skills to uncover the twists, turns and shock revelations. As the complex story unfolded, players had to ensure they worked together to analyse all the information in order to draw a conclusion that fitted the evidence!



MOON ROCKS



A few weeks ago, Goldington Academy students were given an amazing opportunity to view a collection of meteorites, volcanic rocks and samples from the moon on loan from NASA (US National Aeronautics and Space Administration)! The school had the rocks for about a week and students could view the rocks at one o-clock in one of our science labs. There was also an opportunity for staff to view the rocks. On top

of all this, Year Eight students had a science lesson to view and study the collection. We examined a group of rocks and had to determine whether they were meteorites or not via a series of tests involving density and magnetic attraction. We were also allowed to hold a large meteorite made mostly of iron and look at small samples of moon rocks collected during the Apollo missions (1961-1972)! Brandon E Year 8


Using cross curricular links the Year Eight students made their own moon rocks in their food and nutrition lessons.

and Antarctica. We were so impressed with their research, resilience, presentation and communication skills. Well done Year Eight! Here are a couple of examples of their great work.




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



ENGLISH & LITERACY ACROSS THE CURRICULUM

DIVERSITY IN THE ENGLISH CURRICULUM

This year the English department have been working to implement a more diverse range of texts and authors into the curriculum across all year groups.



In Year Seven, we introduced the brand new "Words that Burn" poetry topic, which is a scheme created by Amnesty International challenging students to explore human rights through poetry. We covered a diverse range of topics through examining the poems, including war, racism, gender equality and immigration. Students really enjoyed discussing these key issues in depth and getting creative with their own poetry ideas.

Alongside this, we also added the novel "The Bone Sparrow" to the curriculum. This allowed students further opportunity to explore perspectives on the refugee crisis and equality.

Year Eight continue to study a wide and exciting range of texts, some of which cover issues around class, equality and education. As with previous cohorts, this year group have examined issues surrounding "Global Education", including a look at education systems throughout history, in more deprived and war-torn countries, and hearing about trailblazers in the world of education today, such as Malala. Malala is also one of our Whole School read books during form time, so pupils are able to bring together what they have learned to reflect on the experiences of others in the world.

Year Nine began their English studies this year by looking at a range of stories called "Diverse Shorts". These pieces encouraged students to think critically about important issues surrounding identity and diversity, and covered themes like race, immigration and inequality.

In addition, we introduced a new scheme of work on "Non-Fictional Heroes". Students examined the history and challenges of real-life heroes from a variety of backgrounds, and discussed the impact they had on reshaping views of marginalised groups. Some names we studied include Olaudah Equiano, Katherine Johnson, Marsha P. Johnson and Marcus Rashford. Pupils then researched and created their own persuasive speeches about a modern-day hero who inspired them.

Years Ten and Eleven continue to follow the AQA GCSE syllabus and study set texts linked with this. However, we still have the chance to explore some diversity issues through this work, including discussions surrounding class, hierarchy and power.

We continue to encourage diversity in reading outside of our core English lessons with the vast range of texts on offer in the school library. We also implemented "The Whole School Read" in form time for KS3, where students enjoy being read to from a variety of fiction and non-fiction books from diverse voices. These include 'The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night time", by Mark Hadden, giving the perspective of a boy with autism. We also read Noughts and Crosses by Malorie Blackman, as well as the aforementioned memoir of Malala Yousafzai, just to name a few.

Each fortnight students are taken to the library and our new librarian, Mrs Kelly, is fantastic at signposting students to our wide range of diverse texts on offer; it is so important that our pupils can see themselves reflected in the books that we read here at Goldington.






BLUE PERIS

SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS & DISABILITY UPDATE

The following from the SEN Code of Practice (2015) underpins our provision for students who have Special Educational Needs or a Disability (SEND).

According to the Code of Practice, "a pupil has SEN where their learning difficulty or disability calls for special educational provision, namely provision different from or additional to that normally available to pupils of the same age."

Teachers are responsible for every pupil including those with SEND.



- Teachers are responsible for the progress and development of every pupil in their class, including those who get extra support from teaching assistants or specialist staff.
- The first step in supporting all pupils, including those with SEND, is high-quality teaching, differentiated for individual pupils.
- Some pupils may need additional help to access the curriculum or make expected progress. These pupils may have SEN.

Not every pupil making slower progress has SEN.

Some pupils may make slower progress for a reason unrelated to SEN, such as a gap in their learning.

Teachers regularly assess the progress of all pupils and work with the SENCO to identify whether a pupil has SEN. Some factors to consider are the following:

- Significantly slower than that of their peers starting from the same baseline
- Failing to match or better the pupil's previous rate of progress
- Failing to close the attainment gap between the pupil and their classmates
- Widening the attainment gap

UNIFORM AND EQUIPMENT

All pupils at Goldington Academy must wear the school uniform as set out in the uniform policy, which includes proper school shoes, school tie, blazer and the full PE kit. Exceptions may be granted under certain circumstances, e.g., for medical reasons. Pupils must wear the full school uniform to school every day and should only arrive at school dressed in PE kit if they have been told they can do so. If a child is unable to wear the full uniform for any reason, then parents should communicate this to the school via either the child's Form Tutor or Head of Year.

Hair styles should not include unnatural colours, patterns or designs. Jewellery other than that listed below is not allowed:

- 1. One small plain stud in each ear
- 2. One ring permitted on each hand
- 3. Bracelets on the grounds of religious or medical needs

Any student attending school with piercings that are not permitted will be asked to remove them, once they have healed. No other visible body piercing is acceptable. The school recognises that areas such as uniform can be open to



subjective interpretation and on occasion abuse. Therefore, to avoid difficulty or embarrassment, we ask parents and pupils to operate well within these guidelines rather than at their extremes.

All pupils must bring the basic equipment needed for lessons. On occasions when pupils are not properly equipped for lessons valuable learning time is often lost, which is determinantal to pupil progress. Pupils, at the least, should be equipped with pens, pencils and a ruler.



We are pleased to announce that, as of September, we will be opening a second-hand school uniform shop for all year groups. Uniform will be available to purchase at a discounted rate from a pop-up shop once every half term. Further details about this will be communicated in September. ATTENDANCE FIGURES

Dear Parents/Carers

We have been really proud of the efforts made by our pupils to be in school as much as possible this term. Whilst our attendance figures are unavoidably lower than normal, we have remained considerably above the current national figures – a testament to the resilience of Goldington Academy pupils. Please remember that children can and should attend school if they have a mild seasonal illness, as long as they do not have a main symptom of Covid 19. If in doubt, we advise that children carry out a lateral flow test.

Undoubtedly the pandemic has hindered pupil attendance, however attendance at Goldington Academy remains strong. Absence results in lost learning that cannot be replaced. We ask that parents carefully consider if absence is absolutely necessary when deciding whether or not to keep their child off school for any reason. Our school attendance target is 96%, which is consider to be good attendance by the DFE.

The school day begins at 8.50 am and pupils are expected to be on the school site by this time. We appreciate that sometimes lateness is unavoidable for a number of potential reasons, however we kindly ask that parents let the office know in advance if a pupil will be arriving after 8.50am where possible. Persistent lateness cannot be authorised without just cause.

Please be aware that we are unable to authorise absences for family holidays.

Thank you again for your efforts in ensuring that your child attends school as regularly as possible.

DRAMA

Each member of drama club has auditioned and been cast as well as set the challenge of learning their lines and preparing their own props and costumes. In our Year Nine PLP lessons, students finished the year with an informal performance. Throughout the year we have explored devising theatre, studied practitioners and read a number of play texts as a group – the overarching aim of this work, for the students to find something that resonated with them and sparked their interest. Towards the end of the year, I introduced two renowned plays by John Godber, 'Bouncers' and 'Shakers'. The



plays focus on what it's like to work in the 'nightlife' industry as young adults, depicting caricatures of the social classes and stereotypes of the sexes. The text really stood out to the students, after a number of failed attempts to 'hook them in', and we spent a number of weeks blocking out some key scenes. During the process some students explored other directions and leant more toward devising their own original pieces of theatre, or using a previously explored text. At the end of the process, I was really pleased to see that all students were able to share a performance, be it scripted or devised, in front of an audience, conquering for many a fear of performing! We were also wonderfully supported by a small group of students who took on design and front of house roles. The process was excellent for the students and they got an insight into what it takes to produce work. I particularly enjoyed seeing the students gravitate toward styles of theatre and subject matter that interested them.

TEACHING AND LEARNING — SUMMER STUDY

What is summer learning loss?

Summer learning loss is when students return to school at a lower academic level than the end of the previous school year. This happens when your child doesn't use or practise the skills they have learned at school during the summer break.

The facts on summer learning loss

A recent review of 13 studies, which looked at over 50,000 students suggested that they experience an average summer learning loss estimated to equal about one month of the academic year.

What can you do?

Reading - Encourage your child to read either with you or alone. Reading does not to have to be time consuming to make a difference, as research conducted by the National Literacy Trust found that *"reading for just 10 minutes a day is enough to have an impact on a child's learning"*.


